


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A GOODBYE MESSAGE FROM OUR ADMINISTRAOR LEE MESIC

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UPDATES FROM B.S.O EMBEDDED SERVICES TEAM AT PIONEER RIDGE



Butterfly training is underway and 97 staff are enrolled in the education. Workshops thus far: "It's all about BEING person-centered, Facing the Truth is the start of Culture Change and Creating Mealtimes & Households that matter". Workshop 4 begins Feb. 5th with Mary Kneale, Meaningful Care Matters consultant "Sharing your Story – Starting with Self".

In November 2024 - 10 team members had the opportunity to tour Castlemore, an accredited Butterfly home area in Tall Pines Long Term Care facility, and the first Butterfly Acute care unit for the elderly at William Osler Hospital, both located in Brampton, On. The following day we attended a Meaningful Care Matters Conference about sustaining emotionally focused care and met the Managing Director of Meaningful Care Matters Peter Bewert.





To go along with the new Butterfly philosophy training, some environmental changes are happening on Monarch Manor and throughout the lower level.





Why the bright colours? Persons living with dementia see 6 shades lighter than we do and require bolder contrasting colours for wayfinding. As their disease progresses, their peripheral field of vision and the ability



to decipher if the item is real or a picture, is impaired. They will also experience depth perception issues and difficulty with visual-spatial processing. To recognize directions of halls, doorways, furniture, contrasting colours are imperative. As the brain continues to change, a person's vision who is living with dementia, can only see tunnel/binocular vision.





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After the painting has been completed, themed life stations will be added to areas throughout Monarch Manor:





Once the themed areas have been added to Monarch Manor, the Homes Action Team Committee, which is comprised of families, residents and staff, along with the Meaningful Care Consultant, will be meeting to plan the additional areas. To promote wayfinding for residents, families will then be contacted to bring a favourite item in to decorate the doorway area. At this time, we are looking for the following items: clothesline pulley, vintage nightstands pictured above, men's and women's hats, purses and vintage shoes, scarves, vintage washboard and wooden ironing board, 6 colourful birdhouses of various sizes, small guitar or ukelele, old mirror with scroll work edging, vintage dresser or make up stand. If you have any questions about donating items, please call Judy or Crystal at numbers below.

Another environmental change on Monarch Manor, is the creation of "smells like home". Team members working on night shift prepare the bread maker around 6:00 AM for residents to wake up with the smell of

freshly baking bread. The Day shift then serves the bread in baskets during lunch. Staff have noted improvements in appetites and residents have been interacting more with each other at the tables. Some residents, who usually do not want to stay in the dining room, have been sitting longer for meals. In addition to bread, regular baking aromas and simmering smells from a crock pot are being initiated.



Other B.S.O updates:

~We have recently provided Gentle Persuasive Approach full day training for 13 staff, with future sessions planned throughout 2025.

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A MESSAGE FROM OUR TRAINING DEVELOPMENT AND QUALITY IMPROVEMENT LEAD

Lots of exciting things happening lately for education and quality improvement!

Thanks to the funding we received to support the education and professional growth of our staff, in November we were able to send 10 staff from Food Services, Environmental Services, Recreation and Nursing (PSW, Home Support Worker, RPN and RN) to Toronto to attend an in-person workshop related to the Butterfly Model of Care that we are implementing on Monarch Manor. These staff were able to tour a Butterfly home in the Peel Region and see the impacts of this methodology in real time!



On the quality improvement side, we recently completed a month-long project to implement a scheduling software called UKG. This program integrates staff schedules directly to our payroll program – eliminating manual date entry and improving the accuracy of pay for staff. Staff can view their schedules on their phones or computers, can submit time off requests electronically and can view their worked shifts / pay details in real time, giving them the ability to view their tentative upcoming pay in advance – which allows for early identification of pay errors. This allows us to correct any discrepancies in advance, and ensure employees are paid accurately and without delay!

In the future, we hope to integrate our call out process for available shifts with UKG, which would simplify the process of filling vacancies.

I am also excited to share that we have officially started the process of changing our Electronic Health Record provider from Med e-care to Point Click Care. Our goal go-live date is April 1, 2025 (with a backup date of July 1, 2025). Point Click Care is a very reputable provider of electronic charting, assessment and medication administration processes and our transition brings many benefits for our residents! Point Click Care is the provider of choice in Ontario and receives funding from the Ministry of Long-Term Care to support integration with the RNAO Clinical Pathways modules, which will make tracking indicators and outcomes related to the Best Practice easier to collect and access. This roll-out will also see the implementation of Point of Care charting for our PSW's – a long-awaited move from paper-based tracking sheets to electronic recording of care and services in real time.





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And finally, we will also be transitioning from RAI-MDS 2.0 (the current resident assessment instrument, originally created for hospitals, and used to determine the level of care each of our residents require and impacts the funding we receive) to a brand new interRAI LTCF assessment form (integrated into Point Click Care). It is a person-centered assessment that evaluates the needs, strengths, and preferences of those living in a LTC facility. The goal of the interRAI LTCF assessment is to maximize a person's functional capacity. The information is used to improve the person's quality of life by addressing their physical and mental health and enhancing their independence. With assessment and evaluation tailored to the needs of residents living in long term care, we are anticipating improved accuracy of our acuity levels and in turn, increased funding.

ENVIRONMENTAL SERVICES



Happy new year! Our team has been busy with new projects for this year, while continuing to upgrade lighting throughout the home. The most noticeable changes have occurred on Monarch Manor as our painting vendor has been diligently working on our new paint scheme, consistent with the Butterfly model. As our residents with dementia see colour 6 shades lighter than those without dementia, the very vivid colour appear to be more subdued shades. The recessed entrances to doors are a different colour than the hallways to aid in depth perception. There is still a lot of painting to be completed but it is coming along nicely. The hallways on the first floor

are near completion as well. The bright green hallway leads to the Butterfly Garden and the blue hallway leads to laundry, maintenance and our shipping/receiving area. Door wraps for offices on the first floor are currently being installed and will present a more home like environment.

Plans are underway for outdoor spring work already. Gardens will be expanded, and a new vegetable garden will be constructed in the spring. Our shipping and receiving area are in dire need of rehabilitation and that work is scheduled for late spring or early summer.

We are getting a noticeable amount of additional sunlight in the evenings, and with the first day of spring next month, let's hope the snow melts early this year.
